WHAT IS THE RHODES SCHOLARSHIP?

The Rhodes Scholarship is a **fully funded postgraduate award for young people to study at the University of Oxford, UK.** The Rhodes Trust funds 100 Scholars per year. We select young leaders of outstanding intellect and character who are motivated to engage with global challenges, committed to the service of others and show promise of becoming value-driven, principled leaders for the world's future.

SELECTION CRITERIA – we look for:

- literary and scholastic attainments.
- energy to use one's talents to the full.
- truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindness, unselfishness and fellowship.
- moral force of character and instincts to lead, and to take an interest in one's fellow beings.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA – you must be:

- **Citizenship & residency:** Eligibility to any other Rhodes Scholarship renders you ineligible to apply for a Global Scholarship, i.e. **if you are eligible to apply via any existing Rhodes Constituency, you must apply there.**
- **Age:** You must have reached your 19th and not have passed your 25th birthday on 1 October 2020, which means you must have been born after 30 September 1995 and on or before 1 October 2001.
- **Education:** You must have completed (or will have completed by June / July 2020) an undergraduate degree from a college or university (normally a Bachelor's degree) with a GPA of 3.7 out of 4.0 or higher.

HOW DO I APPLY?

Applications for Rhodes Scholarships open by **1 June**. Shortlisted candidates will then be invited for an in-person interview. WHAT IS THE RHODES SCHOLARSHIP?

The Rhodes Scholarship is a **fully funded postgraduate award for young people to study at the University of Oxford**. The Rhodes Trust funds over 100 Scholars per year. We select young leaders of outstanding intellect and character who are motivated to engage with global challenges, committed to the service of others and show promise of becoming value-driven, principled leaders for the world's future.

WHY APPLY?

The Scholarship is not just a financial bursary, **it is a life-changing opportunity for exceptional young people with the potential to make a difference for good in the world**. Rhodes Scholars are people who have a vision of how the world could be better and the energy to make a difference – whatever their sphere of interest. Rhodes alumni have distinguished themselves in every field.

RHODES SELECTION CRITERIA

Selection in each Rhodes constituency is by committees comprised of Rhodes alumni and distinguished non-Scholar members of the community.

The selection criteria are:

- literary and scholastic attainments
- energy to use one's talents to the full
- truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindness, unselfishness and fellowship
- moral force of character and instincts to lead, and to take an interest in one's fellow beings

WHY APPLY FOR THE RHODES SCHOLARSHIP?



ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

The following eligibility criteria apply to all applicants for the Rhodes Scholarships for Global:

Citizenship & residency: Eligibility to any other Rhodes Scholarship renders you ineligible to apply for a Global Scholarship, i.e. if you are eligible to apply via any existing Rhodes Constituency (<https://www.rhodeshouse.ox.ac.uk/scholarships/list-of-rhodes-scholarship-countries/>), you must apply there.

Age: You must have reached your 19th and not have passed your 25th birthday on 1 October 2020, which means you must have been born after 30 September 1995 and on or before 1 October 2001

Education: You must have completed (or will have completed by June / July 2020) an undergraduate degree from a college or university (normally a Bachelor's degree) with a GPA of 3.7 out of 4.0 or higher. In this respect, please note carefully the requirements for your chosen course at Oxford, where entry requirements may exceed those of the Scholarship.

TIMELINE



Please note: dates vary slightly due to which Rhodes constituency you are apply to. Candidates must first win a Scholarship before applying to the University of Oxford.

THE PROCESS

1. Application to the Scholarship:

- Applications for the Rhodes scholarships for Global open 1 June of the year preceding commencement of study at the University of Oxford.
- Candidates for Global have a 3-step process: submission of a nomination from your university, application to the Rhodes Scholarship, selection and then application to the University of Oxford.
- All candidates for the Scholarship should read the information about the Scholarships applicable globally, and then proceed to their country-specific page at www.rhodeshouse.ox.ac.uk/apply.

In broad terms, all constituencies will require the following materials in differing forms:

- Evidence of academic record/transcript (complete or in progress) of undergraduate degree and any postgraduate study
- Curriculum vitae/resumé or list of principal activities
- Personal statement or essay (including, crucially, a clear statement of what the applicant wishes to study at Oxford and why)
- Evidence of age/birth certificate/passport
- English Language proficiency (where English is not the first language)
- Photograph (not visible to selectors until after short-listing)
- List of referees (several are required) who can attest in confidential references to the character and intellect of the applicant, including academic, personal, extra-curricular and leadership achievements

RHODES APPLICATION PROCESS FOR GLOBAL



2. Choice of course in the University of Oxford:

Subject to limited restrictions, Rhodes Scholars may read for any full-time postgraduate degree (including the BA with senior status over two years) at the University of Oxford. The basic tenure of the Scholarship is two years, subject always, and at all times, to satisfactory academic performance and personal conduct.

At the discretion of the Trustees, the Scholarship may be extended for a third year for those who take a recognised route to the DPhil. See the *Conditions of Tenure* on the Rhodes Trust website:

Note to applicants

Successful candidates will be asked to provide original copies of academic transcripts (and other supporting documents as required). References may be checked during application review, and any applications deemed fraudulent will be rejected. Authors of fraudulent applications will be pursued to the full extent possible under the law.

A Rhodes Scholarship is confirmed once a successful candidate has been offered a place in a Department or Faculty of the University of Oxford and in a college.

MYTHS

You must be the top of your class

Academic ability is essential as you will need to be able to thrive at the University of Oxford; however, even more important is your commitment to serve others.

This is not true anymore! We now offer 2 Rhodes Scholarships for Global to anyone who does not meet the existing selection criteria for the current Rhodes countries (constituencies). The application process varies slightly in that you must acquire a nomination from your university in order to apply for the Rhodes Scholarship. Rhodes Scholarships are only for students from commonwealth countries

It is only for students from "Elite" universities

Scholars come from all types of universities and frequently students win the Scholarship at an institution that has never had a winner before. So don't be afraid to apply from wherever you are currently studying!

MYTHS

You have to be sporty

This is not true – the selection criteria does mention that applicants need ‘energy to use one’s talents to the full’ but this can be demonstrated through a wide variety of extra-curricular pursuits and leadership opportunities – e.g. in music, debate, dance, theatre, art and sports.

The public’s most immediate associations with the Rhodes Scholarships are often western world political leaders such as Bill Clinton, Bob Hawke and Malcolm Turnbull. Today’s Rhodes Scholars include Presidents and Prime Ministers, but also medical researchers, social workers, teachers and activists.

Most Scholars end up as political leaders

I can’t apply because of the subject I want to study

The University of Oxford offers a wide range of subjects across all the academic disciplines. Their graduate course pages provide essential information about each department and the courses that they offer for 2019/20 entry to help you to narrow your focus to a particular course. As long as you can demonstrate you have worked to improve the lives of others that is what counts. It can be done in a multitude of ways in your own neighbourhood. You will also need to be able to talk in the interview about what you hope to do in the future.

For the grants programme, four community development organisations were selected from hundreds of applicants, and each received a small grant of £1,500. Funds for this were raised from voluntary stipend deductions and Scholar-led fundraising ventures, including the ‘Welcome Day Auction’ in Michaelmas, the ‘Promises Auction’ in Hilary, and the ‘Rhodies and Friends Recital’ in Trinity, all of which have become popular fixtures on the Rhodes community calendar.” - *Nchimunya Nelisa Tebeka (Zambia & Wolfson 2016)*

RHODES FORUMS & CONVENINGS

There are 3 -4 Forums per year for Rhodes Scholars to get involved with by joining the Scholar Committee. This involves organising the programme, selecting the speakers and leading the conference. These Forums attract more than 700 Rhodes Scholars and are a way to tackle issues of social justice, healthcare, entrepreneurship and climate change.

The last convening was the 4th Rhodes Annual Healthcare Forum which explored the theme ‘From Surviving to Thriving’.



COMING UP & GOING DOWN DINNER

Twice a year Rhodes Scholars have an official welcome and farewell dinner with the Rhodes Trust’s Trustees in Milner Hall at Rhodes House. This has happened since the house was built in 1929.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT COSTS DOES A RHODES SCHOLARSHIP COVER?

- All University and College fees;
- The University application fee;
- A personal stipend which is fixed by the Trustees (£14,700 per annum 2017/18); One economy class airfare to Oxford at the start of the scholarship and one economy flight back to the student’s home country at the conclusion of the scholarship; International Health Charge.

There is an online application process followed by in person interviews for the shortlisted candidates.

WHEN DOES A RHODES SCHOLARSHIP COMMENCE?

Scholars come into residence in Oxford in September of the year following their selection.



HOW IMPORTANT IS THE PERSONAL ESSAY/STATEMENT?

It is crucial. The requirements vary by country - consult the Memorandum for Candidates for your country. Keep in mind that the personal statement is your chance to tell your story: who you are, what matters to you, and what you hope to do in the world. Your academic transcript, your list of activities/CV and your reference letters will provide the substantive detail of your commitments and accomplishments, but this essay gives you the opportunity to cast the overarching narrative for the selection committee. You would also need to give a clear statement of what you wish to study at Oxford and why. The personal statement must be entirely your own work.

WHAT COURSE OF STUDY CAN A RHODES SCHOLARSHIP BE USED FOR?

It can be used for the vast majority of courses of study offered by the University of Oxford. However, it is more than just support for a degree, it is an investment in an individual’s potential. Rhodes House offers a comprehensive Character, Service and Leadership Programme which includes workshops, speaker series and retreats.

WHAT IS THE VALUE OF A RHODES SCHOLARSHIP?

The Rhodes Scholarship is a life-changing opportunity for exceptional young people with the potential to make a difference for good in the world. A Rhodes Scholar joins a remarkable global community of Senior Scholars working across all sectors. It is a life-long connection which goes far beyond financial value.



WHAT SHOULD I EXPECT AT THE INTERVIEW?

Selection committees are made up of Rhodes Scholars and community leaders from diverse backgrounds. The interview is of core importance as it is here that selection committees have the opportunity to weigh up a candidate's depth of engagement, accomplishments, and aspirations. In posing their questions, committee members initiate discussion that will help them ascertain who best represents the selection criteria.

Proven intellectual and academic attainment of a high standard is the first quality required of Scholars, but they are also required to show exceptional character, leadership in extra-curricular activities, and a commitment to service in the public good. The interview will therefore be wide-ranging in nature, designed to test candidates' intellectual skills and reasoning ability, but also to reveal their character, core commitments, and potential to make a positive contribution to society.

WHAT ARE THE RESTRICTIONS?
